First Kids Camp will not only give children the experience and joy of following Jesus through worship, Bible stories, crafts, and recreation, but we hope it will also meet a need for our working parents who need child care during the summer. First Baptist is working hard to build a net that supports families in our church and community and we believe First Kids Camp is a great opportunity to do just that.

Mornings at First Kids Camp will be filled with kid-friendly worship, bible studies and games. In the afternoons, we will switch gears and have special activities and guest speakers. The morning will be staffed with volunteers, while in the afternoon we will have paid workers to help out. The morning (from 9:00-1:00) is free, but to offset the cost of extended hours paid workers and afternoon activities there will be a fee of \$25 per child.


Two New Sunday Small Group Opportunities

On Sunday March 5, the Discussion Class, which meets in the Parlor on the second floor of the education building, is beginning a new series on the book Final Words From the Cross by Adam Hamilton. Each session will include a 10 minute video of the author discussing the final sayings of Jesus. Moving through each chapter, you will begin to understand and respond to Jesus' final words at the cross while learning about those who were eye witnesses to the crucifixion. In the final chapter, Hamilton moves beyond the cross to Jesus' words to the disciples on the road to Emmaus and to those who were witnesses to the Resurrection. Bob Russell will be leading the series.

Will You Walk to Emmaus?

The Walk to Emmaus is a spiritual renewal program intended to strengthen the local church through the development of Christian disciples and leaders. First Baptist attenders, Dave and Julie Walker, are involved in the leadership of this program and invite you to participate.

The Walk to Emmaus experience begins with a 72-hour short course in Christianity, comprised of fifteen talks by lay and clergy on the themes of God's grace, disciplines of Christian discipleship, and what it means to be the church.

The course is wrapped in prayer and meditation, special times of worship and daily celebration of Holy Communion. The "Emmaus community," made up of those who have attended an Emmaus weekend, supports the 72-hour experience with a prayer vigil, by preparing and serving meals, and other acts of love and self-giving. The Emmaus Walk typically begins Thursday evening and concludes Sunday evening. Men and women attend separate weekends.

The next Men's Walk is March 16-March 19, 2017 and the next Women's Walk is March 30-April 2, 2017. The cost for the 3 nights is \$160 and includes room and board. Full paid scholarships are available for those with need.

John and Melinda have both worked at Mizzou for over 20 years. They spend most of their free time with family,



What is Quest Family Camp? Think of it as a youth camp, kid's camp, an adult retreat, your family vacation, and a place to get away and be with God all rolled into ONE!



How will that work?

* Students grade 6-12 will have the Quest experience with separate rooming, Bible Study tracks, evening events, etc. All of this will still be directed by the Quest staff as it was last year.

* Concurrently, Quest will offer tracks for adults, college students, and elementary school kids, as well as childcare for infants and toddlers.

* Youth and kids will have time with their own age group as well as times of corporate worship and play with everyone. * Adults will find time for: quiet prayer, relevant Bible Study experiences and group discussions on parenting and faith, opportunities to enjoy the facilities including hiking, time on the lake, or even a round of golf, and more.

* As an added bonus, the camp is incorporating a date night just for adults, giving couples time to reconnect while their kids enjoy planned activities.

Not only does this promise to be a great camp experience, but will give our church members the opportunity to build shared memories and grow together in faith and support. We hope you will make every effort for everyone in your family to join in. We are still working out the details for cost, but it certainly will be less than your family would spend for a week of vacation together, and the potential benefits for your family, our church, and our kids are incredible.

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In 2017, Lent begins on March 1 with Ash Wednesday and ends on April 16 with Easter. Our Lenten Worship Series is entitled Poured Out. It focuses on the "elements" (oil, water, wine, blood, and tears) that show up in the story of the week leading up to Jesus' crucifixion.

R oman centurion sheds Jesus' blood - John 19: 28-42 (April 9th)
