Predatory Lending

Since its inception, I have been a part of the monthly clergy round table for Faith Voices, a grassroots, faith-based organization formed to improve the quality of life in Columbia and throughout Missouri. This week, Columbia Faith Voices asked if First Baptist would host a press conference about predatory lending on Friday, May 6 at noon in front of the church. When I got the call, I sent an email to the Church Council asking for their support in hosting the event, and they agreed.

Here is why I think this is important: We say that we are a church that “celebrates and promotes Christ’s call for social justice and seeks to make a difference in our community and world.” Scripture speak strongly against unjust lending and taking advantage of the poor. Just to give you two examples: in Ezekiel 18, the prophet describes a righteous man, observing, “He does not oppress anyone, but returns what he took in pledge for a loan. He does not commit robbery but gives his food to the hungry and provides clothing for the naked. He does not lend to them at interest or take a profit from them.” This doesn’t mean you can’t make money in the lending business, but it warns against using financial leverage to hurt those with few other options. And Proverbs 2:22 puts it like this: “Do not exploit the poor because they are poor and do not crush the needy in court.”



Payday loan shops are everywhere in our country and especially in Missouri. Our state is home to more payday lenders than McDonald’s, Starbuck’s, and Wal-mart stores combined. Payday loans are small, short-term loans that are secured by a borrower’s personal check. The average interest rate and fees on such loans in Missouri is 450%, with a cap set at 1,950%. While a payday loan seems like a good solution at first, its terms tend to trap people in debt. Because the loan and fees are due in full within two weeks to a month, the borrower is forced to come up with a sizable amount of cash in a short time. As a result, the borrower often ends up taking out another loan to pay off the first. According to the Center for Responsible Lending, the average payday loan borrower takes out nine loans per year!

On February 25, Faith Voices clergy met with Speaker of the House Todd Richardson at the Greene County Baptist Association to talk about predatory lending reform. Speaker Richardson said he would support the bill filed by Missouri House Representative Lynn Morris of Ozark. HB 1105 would cap the rate for all payday and title loans at 36% annually, all fees included. However, with only a few days left in the legislative session, it looks like the Missouri House will stall on having a hearing on a Republican-led bill geared to cap payday loans at 36%.

It is really no wonder, because between 2011-2015:

Speaker Todd Richardson took \$18,500 in contributions from payday lenders

- Chair of the Financial Institutions Committee, Rep. Sandy Crawford, took \$13,050 in contributions from payday lenders
- The Missouri Republican Party took almost \$80,000 in contributions from payday lenders
- The Missouri Democratic Party took \$50,000 in contributions from payday lenders

Consequently, to push the bill forward, Faith Voices chapters in Springfield, Jefferson City, and Columbia are organizing on May 5th at noon, a week before the end of the legislative session, to:

- Lift up the role of faith communities to bring public witness to the moral choices of our elected officials.
- Place clear bipartisan responsibility in the hands of our state legislators.
- Call out legislators on both sides of the aisle who take payday money and tie this problem to the larger issue of money in politics, and name money in politics as a moral issue.
- Lift up the legislators who co-sponsored this bill - Rep. Lynn Morris (R) and Rep. Martha Stevens (D)
- Call on people of faith to join us and raise their voices in support of these moral issues.



Payday Lending: How it affects borrowers

Two real-life stories

“I have four [payday lenders]. On a monthly basis I pay \$350 worth of interest ... In a way they are doing a favor for people, but in the long run it’s not a favor. You have to pay them to get your money back so you can pay someone else. It’s not designed so you can get yourself together - it’s designed for you to come back to them (payday lenders).”

How a payday loan spirals into long-term debt: Patricia’s story:

Patricia, a retired nursing home aid, encountered medical issues and decided it was best to move closer to her family. To do so, Patricia had to pay double rent for one month and rent a small moving truck. This was

more than she could afford on her small monthly disability income. Since her family members were also struggling financially, she sought out cash from payday lenders to help her cover moving-related expenses. Patricia took out three loans: two for \$200, and another for \$150. The total interest for these loans totaling \$550 amounted to \$123.50, resulting in her having to pay back \$673.50 (\$550 principal plus \$123.50 in interest) to fully retire the debt. With her limited income, she was unable to pay more than the interest on the loans. For nearly two years, Patricia continued to pay the finance charges each month. Patricia paid over \$2,700 in interest only, and not one penny toward the principal balance of \$550.

Come out to the press conference at noon this Friday and stand against predatory lending.
