At First Baptist, we want to partner with parents to be the primary educators of their children in matters of faith and other important topics like sexuality.

Cost of the event is \$10/person or \$20/couple, which includes dinner for the whole family and childcare for infants up to grade 5. After dinner, the nursery

Personnel working with the Romany people in Europe since 1996.

Keith likens the CBF Offering for Global Missions to "the value of an air tank to a scuba diver." The money we give to this offering is what makes it possible for them to stay and work in this unique environment. Keith further explains,

"We are in this together. Some of us have the gift of going. Some of us have the gift of praying. Some of us have the gift of giving. The Offering for Global Missions directly connects us . . . out there somewhere . . . with you. The Offering for Global Missions provides for field personnel's long-term presence in the field. Our colleagues from partner organizations who are completely self-supporting spend twice as much time as we do in partnership development, raising funds, and worrying about whether or not they are going to be staying on the field. We do not have to worry about whether or not we will be able to be here next year. We know that because of your partnership, our salary, housing, and similar basic benefits will be paid. Thank you for giving to the Offering for Global Missions. Thank you for our salary, our housing, and our ability to focus on something other than paying the light bill."

I am proud of our church's long history of supporting missionary activity around the world both directly and though collaborative efforts with partners like CBF. Know that as your pastor, I will continue to work within CBF to build on the good changes being made so that one day soon all who feel called to serve God in the mission field will be welcomed. Until then, may this church continue to be an example of grace and love as we support the Kingdom work that our CBF Field Personnel have been doing for decades. 
Life Line Screening


Scholarship Opportunities

Holy Week at First Baptist

Palm Sunday - March 25: Palm Sunday is a joyous and special day at First Baptist, with palm processionals in both services, as well as the Downtown Palm Sunday Service in conjunction with other area churches. This special service takes place in the middle of the street on Broadway! We will meet on the front lawn at 10:20 and walk downtown together. Awakening (9:15 am) and Traditional (11:15 am) worship will meet as usual on Palm Sunday; children are invited to take part in a Palm Sunday processional at the beginning of both worship services. Parents, please bring your children to the back of the worship space a few minutes before worship, so they can receive a palm leaf and join the processional!

Good Friday - March 30: Friday: the day the world turned dark and all hope turned to lament - the day of death. On Good Friday, March 30, we will gather in worship at 6 pm in the Fellowship Hall to join in the lament of those who follow Christ. It is a final moment of preparation prior to the joy of Easter.

Easter Sunday - April 1: Easter morning begins with a celebration of the Resurrection at the 9:15 am Awakening Contemporary Worship in the Fellowship Hall. Everyone is invited to enjoy pastries and beverages from 10:15 - 11:15 am. Traditional Worship will celebrate the Risen Christ at 11:15 am in the Sanctuary.
