Everything Must Change by Brian D. McLaren


In September, I will be facilitating a discussion of the book Everything Must Change by Brian McLaren. Many of you know I am fan of Brian McLaren and often read his work. After reading Everything Must Change, I found myself longing to have people to talk about it and decided to invite you to become conversation partners!

The book is easy to read because McLaren's style is not academic. At the same time, the scope

of the book is vast and seeks to answer two questions: First, what are the most critical problems in our world today? Second, how does the life and teachings of Jesus address the most critical global problems?

We might have one group meeting via Zoom and another group meeting in-person on the front lawn, while wearing masks and physically distancing.

Conversation on Christian Nationalism

August 9 & 16

On August 9 and 16 at 10:15 am via Zoom, Brian Kaylor will be our guest speaker for a conversation on Christian Nationalism. Christian Nationalism is an ideology, which seeks to merge Christian and American identities and in doing so, distorts both the Christian faith and America's constitutional democracy. Christian Nationalism equates being a Christian with being and American and asserts that Christianity should be privileged by the State over other religions. Christian Nationalism implies that to be a good American, one must be Christian.



In the last few years, we have seen a rise in legislation around the country, and in Missouri, which attempts to advance the cause of Christian Nationalism. Some Christians have launched an effort known as "Project Blitz" in hopes of fusing Christianity and American Civic Life. Lawmakers in more than a dozen states used model bills from *Project Blitz*, on topics like encouraging classes on "Bible literacy" in public schools and mandating public schools post "In God We Trust." In April of 2019, our Pastor Carol McEntyre testified in Jefferson City against one of these bills, a biblical literacy bill, which encourages public schools to teach the Bible. Baptists have historically stood for religious liberty for all, and believed that everyone should be free to practice their faith or to have no faith if they so choose. Faith should never be coerced. We hope you will join us for this important conversation about religious liberty for all!

Brian Kaylor is editor & president of Word&Way, associate director of Churchnet, and author of four books on religion, politics, and communication. He graduated with an M.A. and Ph.D. in political communication from the University of Missouri.

Compassion Camp 2020

Compassion Camp concluded on Sunday, August 2, with a drive-thru closing in the church parking lot. Over the past 5 weeks, 35 campers from 22 families have been exploring the theme of compassion in our virtual Vacation Bible School. VBS has looked many different ways for us at First Baptist over the last several years, most notably for the past three years as First Kids Camp. Our VBS team was already revisioning First Kids Camp towards a family-centered experience, but the pandemic required us to rethink it all again! After receiving feedback from families, we decided to launch a 5 week, completely online, virtual VBS. Kids and their families could join in Zoom calls and watch parties or watch and read lessons at their own pace. Campers learned that compassion means I see your hurt, I feel your hurt, and I will work to ease your hurt. They explored five different ways of compassion: seeing and welcoming, being brave and showing up, loving ourselves, being present with each other, and giving fresh starts. And they learned when we do these things, we show God's love, peace, and justice with the world.

Thank you, First Baptist, for supporting our Kids Ministry and our dream to rethink Vacation Bible School in a safe and fun way during a pandemic. Thank you First Kids Families, for trusting us with this wild and audacious dream to talk about compassion and find a way to have camp even if apart. 
Blizzards with Brittany
