

Word from the Pastor



First Baptist Family,

As I have tried to find my way these last few weeks, after the death of my father from COVID-19, the cards, texts, meals and Facebook messages you have sent have been a source of comfort and strength. I am grateful for your love and care. In addition, I was deeply moved by how many of you watched my father's memorial service. You are an incredibly compassionate church family, and I am grateful to be part of the fold. I would remiss if I did not take a moment to thank Pastor Brittany McDonald Null for leading the congregation so ably in my absence. Along with Brittany, Shelby Myers, Awakening Praise Band Director and Amy Johns, Director of Traditional Worship and Colleen Ostercamp, Church Organist and all our incredible volunteers did an amazing job of putting together all the Christmas season worship services too. I am grateful to have such a gifted team to work with.

Last Sunday in worship, Pastor Carol began the service with some reflection on the week's events and an opening prayer. Reprinted for you here:

I want to begin with a prayer for our country because I know the insurrection at our nation's capital is on all our hearts and minds. I am still rattled by what took place on Wednesday. This has been a traumatic week filled with fear, sorrow, and anger. As I watched in horror on Wednesday, I was shocked, but honestly, I was not surprised. Because words matter and the truth matters. What happened on Wednesday was the product of years of hateful and divisive rhetoric in our country's political life and in the leadership of our former president.

In addition, the truth matters. Some things are true, meaning they are based in reality; they are factual. An inability to discern what is true has eroded our common life as a country. The rise of conspiracy theories, like QAnon, which have NO connection to reality, are a dangerous result of this inability to discern truth. This week, we have seen how these online movements can lead to violence. For the last few years, I have thought that to speak of QAnon and other conspiracy theories was to empower them. But I now realize that Christians who are called to be truthtellers, must speak of these things. After all we follow Christ, who is the way, the truth and the life (John 14:6).

So, we have much work to do as citizens of this country and as people of faith, who stand on the side of truth, love, justice, civility, hope and peace. In the coming months, we will continue to talk about all these issues and how we live in the way of Jesus.

Will you pray with me?

O God, we come to you in this moment of prayer, bringing to you the pain and horror of this week. The images we saw in our nation's capital were terrifying and many of us lost sleep this week as we worried about the fate of our country. We know this violence was the antithesis of your dream of peace for the world and we lament how far we have to go before liberty and justice for all is a reality.

O God, you have borne witness to all of human history and have seen empires rise and fall, forgive us for refusing to see that our democracy is fragile. Lord open our eyes to see our country as a gift and deliver us from our pride. As a country, we have flirted with disaster by continuing to elect and empower politicians whose words and actions have led us to a moment of crisis. May we finally learn that words matter as does character. This week, we have witnessed the logical consequences of our former leader's rhetoric and watched in horror as angry white men and women stormed our Capitol.

As we watched, we confess that anger rose in our own hearts and minds; rage grew in our bellies over these acts of insurgence. O God, when will we learn that violence and anger only lead us further down the path of destruction?

We pray for changed hearts and minds.

May we learn to follow the Prince of Peace down the path of non-violence, in word and deed. A path that leads not to judgement and destruction, but to hope, to love, to kindness, to peace and equity for all.

This week, we witnessed a shameful display of confederate flags and signs with racist slogans paraded around in our nation's capital. We witnessed an obvious difference between how law enforcement treated the rioters on Wednesday versus how Black Lives Matter protesters were treated over the summer. We pray that you will deliver us from the racism that has plagued our country and was on full display at the Capitol this week. Oh, God deliver us from the forces of evil and white supremacy. And may we root out the laws and practices in our country, which foster injustice. God of Mercy, hear our prayer.

As we watched on Wednesday, we also witnessed a hijacked version of Christianity as rioters carried crosses and signs bearing the name of Jesus along with their confederate flags. Lord, deliver us from this dangerous mix of racism and Christian nationalism.

Oh, God of Mercy, hear our prayer.








First Baptist Book Club 2nd Tuesdays every other month 7 pm via Zoom
