




Sign Up - ForColumbia

Word from the Pastor



First Baptist,

I am looking forward to Sunday, June 6, and our return to in person worship in the Sanctuary. I cannot wait to worship together in our sacred space. At the same time, I know the pandemic has changed the landscape of ministry going forward. I recognize that many people are looking forward to coming back to in-person worship in our building, but others will choose to continue worshiping primarily online. I get it, particularly for those who no longer drive, for those who are part of our church but don't live in Columbia, and for others who prefer to worship online, this is a new reality. To thrive in the future, our congregation needs to embrace this new digital landscape and see it as an opportunity to grow our ministry and outreach. This is a shift in how we do things and change in our philosophy of ministry. Our church leadership is trying to think "hybrid church," meaning how do we minister to people who are here in person and online. We want to see digital not as an 'accommodation', but as real ministry and a chance to reach more people simultaneously. You may wonder, "What does this mean for our church going forward?" In the future, some events will be in-person only, some will be online only, and many others will be hybrid (accessible to an in-person and online congregation). We know this will take some getting used to and a lot of forethought and work on our part.

Right now, we are also trying to figure out how to make the worship service in our sanctuary (and eventually) the fellowship hall more conducive to the hybrid experience. In 2019, our webcast was simply a bird's eye view of worship in the Sanctuary (and Fellowship Hall). Those watching online were eavesdropping on our worship service and the webcast wasn't really focused on the online participants. Now we speak to the online worshippers, our camera placement is focused on them; we have virtual greeters and the ability to respond through online chat, providing text and lyrics on the broadcast screen for participants, and many more adjustments have created a webcast that allows those online to engage with our worship experience as active participants, not just viewers. Our goal in the coming months is to figure out how to build on what we have learned during the pandemic about online worship and craft worship that meets the needs of those worshipping in person and online at the same time. We know this is going to be an adjustment and take some time. I ask for your patience, your prayers, and your help as we work to figure this out!

Changes to Worship Schedule - Beginning Sunday, June 6

- We will move our outdoor, in-person, on-lawn service to 9:15 am. This will allow those who might not be ready to worship indoors the opportunity to continue worshipping outside even as the weather warms up.
- Our 11:15 am service will be a hybrid service for both in-person, indoor worship in the sanctuary
 and online. The hybrid service will maintain social distancing in the sanctuary with designated
 seating areas. Masks will be required at all times for attendees, even if vaccinated.

Contemplative Retreat at Conception Abbey

October 8-10 (Friday morning through Sunday evening), you are invited to join me, Pastor Carol, for a contemplative retreat at Conception Abbey, a beautiful Benedictine monastery located in northwest Missouri. The quiet setting and rural atmosphere of Conception Abbey is the ideal place for retreat.



A contemplative retreat is an opportunity to set aside time to be quiet and spend time with God. The schedule for the retreat is intentionally very open. On Friday afternoon, we will gather at the Abbey for worship and to set the intention for the weekend. You will receive a simple devotional guide with questions, scriptures, and quotes for reflection. Then, we will enter a 24-hour period of silence and listening. During the 24-hour period (from Friday evening, until Saturday evening) you are free to rest, read, journal or walk the lovely grounds at the abbey. You may also choose to join the monastic community for prayer in the Basilica; they gather six times a day to pray. After the Saturday evening meal, we will gather to share what we have experienced during our day of silence, followed by a time of fellowship. Sunday morning, we join in worship again, and share a meal before returning home.

A motel-type building at the Abbey allows private rooms. We will have six scheduled meals in the dining hall—dinner Friday through lunch on Sunday. The cost is \$150.00 for a single room or a double room is \$145.00. Meals are included in the cost. We have 10 rooms reserved, which means registration is limited and early registration is encouraged. To register or for more information contact Pastor Carol at mcentyre@fbc-columbia.org.

Summer One Read (s)




First Baptist Summer One Read(s)

Convictions: How I Learned What Matters Most by Marcus Borg

On his seventieth birthday, the renowned progressive Christian scholar Marcus Borg wrote Convictions. He shares how his bedrock religious beliefs were formed, contending that Christians in America are at their best when they focus on hope and transformation. This book is a manifesto for all progressive Christians who seek the best path for following Jesus today.

With each chapter discussing a distinct conviction, Borg writes provocatively and compellingly on the beliefs that can deeply ground us and guide us, such as: God is real, and a mystery and salvation is more about this life than an afterlife.




Summer One Read (s)




Native: Identity, Belonging, and Rediscovering God by Kaitlin Curtice.

Native is about identity, soul-searching, and the neverending journey of finding ourselves and finding God. As both a citizen of the Potawatomi Nation and a Christian, Kaitlin Curtice offers a unique perspective on these topics. Curtice writes about how reconnecting with her Potawatomi identity both informs and challenges her faith. Native is part memoir describing Kaitlin's faith journey and part historically reckoning, as she grapples with the ways the church has often been intertwined with white supremacy.

Native is deeply personal, beautifully written, and thought provoking. Each section begins with an illustrated poem from Potawatomi tradition.





Invitation to the Psalms by Rolf A. Jacobson & Karl N. Jacobson

This book was chosen to enhance our fall Shepherd Lecture. Dr. Nancy DeClaisse-Walford a Hebrew Bible scholar and professor at McAfee School of Theology will be our fall Shepherd Lecture speaker. She will be leading a multiweek Bible Study, during the 10:15 Small Group hour, on the Psalms beginning September 12. She recommended our first Summer One Read, which is Invitation to the Psalms by Rolf A. Jacobson.

Invitation to the Psalms is a winsome accessible introduction to the Psalms that delves into how to read Hebrew poetry, the Psalter's basic genres, the metaphorical world of the Psalms, and the theology of the Psalms.
