Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did, [by raising Lazarus from the dead] believed in him. But some of them went to the Pharisees and told them what he had done. So the chief priests and the Pharisees called a meeting of the council, and said, "What are we to do? This man is performing many signs. If we let him go on like this, everyone will believe in him, and the Romans will come and destroy both our holy place and our nation." But one of them, Caiaphas, who was high priest that year, said to them, "You know nothing at all! You do not understand that it is better for you to have one man die for the people than to have the whole nation destroyed." He did not say this on his own, but being high priest that year he prophesied that Jesus was about to die for the nation, and not for the nation only, but to gather into one the dispersed children of God. So from that day on they planned to put him to death.

Our ancient curse we could not see, making our peace in crowds of violent harmony. For thus since Eden's fall victims unite us all: No more of this, no more of this. Remember me.

So Satan's rule made doubly sure, who sows our discord and in turn its bitter cure. For ev'ry hopeless strife some scapegoat pays the price: No more of this, no more of this. Remember me.

When guilt's assigned, and lots are cast, no one is safe, either among the first or last.

Look in the victim's face: We could be in that place.

No more of this, no more of this. Remember me.

Around the cross we join the throng whether from hatred or from fear, the common wrong. This reconciling way has endless cost to pay: No more of this, no more of this. Remember me.

Observance of Holy Communion

Words of Invitation (responsive)

When Jesus sat at tables and broke bread with tax collectors, lawyers, rich elites, and poor peasants, he proclaimed that God's gracious love and abiding presence know no bounds. Through these occasions of sharing food, people experienced God, and shared in God's Kin-dom. A Kin-dom, where: all are welcome, worthy, and invited; lives are transformed and empowered; and the fruits of God's gentle justice bloom throughout all Creation.

All people, including each of us, are invited to share in this sacred meal of celebration, and be strengthened by the presence of God in this place.

Words of Institution (responsive)

When his arrest seemed near, Jesus ate a meal in an upper room with the disciples. He took bread and after having given thanks to You, Holy God, he broke it and gave it to the disciples, this time saying, "Do this to remember me." After the meal he shared wine, gave thanks, and said, "I will not drink from this cup again until I drink it with you in the Kin-dom of God."

Jesus was then unjustly killed by the systems of domination of his day. But the resurrection provided a new hope. We thank you, Holy God, that the last supper wasn't the last meal – or the last word! His execution wasn't the end. The Kin-dom persisted – and persists today – through the people who seek to be your resurrection community. Despite the divisions, violence, and injustice in the world, God continually brings forth renewed hope for love, justice, and mutuality to and through each of us. Therefore, Holy God, in the sharing of this bread and cup, we joyfully celebrate the hope-inspiring ministry and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Holy God, bless each of us, and the meal we will share, so we may be:
opened to your abiding presence,
nourished by your gracious love,
and strengthened by your resurrection power.
Amen!

Friday: the day the world turned dark and all hope was lost - the day of death. On Good Friday, we will gather at 6:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall to join the lament of those who follow Christ. It is a final moment of preparation prior to the joy of Easter.

Easter morning begins with a celebration of the Resurrection at the 9:15 am Awakening Contemporary Worship Service in the Fellowship Hall. Everyone is invited to enjoy pastries and beverages from 10:15 am to 11:15 am. Traditional Worship will celebrate the Risen Christ at 11:15 am in the Sanctuary.

Models of Atonement

Christus Victor (Victory Model): When humanity sinned, we became captive to evil (such as sin, death or Satan). When Jesus died, it looked like evil won, but with the resurrection Jesus defeated the power of sin and death and evil.

Satisfaction (Payment Model): God's holiness and justice demands that debt of sin be paid. Jesus' death pays the price for human sin.

Moral Influence Model: People are moved by the love of God displayed in Christ's self-giving death. Jesus' life and death is then a catalyst; the power of the Holy Spirit will transform human beings and the world.

Scapegoat Model: Jesus is a victim of human violence and sin. His death on the cross reveals humanity's propensity to violence and overcomes it by submitting to it. The Scapegoat Model, or what is sometimes called non-violent atonement, says that Jesus didn't have to die. We killed him. Jesus is a victim of human violence and sin. His death on the cross reveals human's propensity to violence. It is like a mirror held up to us that reveals the darkness in our own hearts. On the cross, Jesus submitted to human violence. Jesus' death is redemptive, however, because of its effect on humanity. It provides the means whereby violence is exposed for what it is and enables human beings to be extracted from their own prison of hatred and be reconciled to God through the mediation of Jesus. God used our own sin to save us.

Solidarity Model: Jesus died in solidarity with us, he underwent the ultimate consequences of living in a sinful world, in order to demonstrate the depths of God's love and God's desire to save us.
